Asylum seeker, refugee or migrant: WhatÕs the difference?

An Ôasylum æekerÕ is someone who is seeking protection but has not yet had their refugee claim determined by an official Đin other words, they might be a refugee, but we do not yet know because no one has heard and evaluated their claim.

A ÔrefugeeÕ is someone who has a ell-founded fear of being persecuted for reasons of their race, religion, nationality, political opinion or membership of a particular social group, and who
